Nomination Day



Halimah Yacob – First Female President of Singapore

Over 40 SMOU leaders, Executive Committee members and Wavelink Maritime Institute lecturers showed up at the People's Association headquarters on Nomination Day on 13 September and cheered as Madam Halimah Yacob arrived with her assentors.

The SMOU family, including SMOU President Capt Robin Foo, General Secretary (GS) Mary Liew and Emeritus GS Thomas Tay, joined over 600 unionists, members of the public and grassroots representatives in rooting for the veteran unionist and former Speaker of Parliament to be Singapore's first female head of state.

Her nomination was proposed by Mr Teo Siong Seng, Singapore Business Federation Chairman and PIL Managing Director, while Ms Liew, who is also NTUC President, was one of the eight assentors for this nomination.

President Halimah was "deeply heartened" by the overwhelming encouragement from her supporters. In her speech, she emphasised the importance of multi-racialism and meritocracy: **"Although this is a reserved election, I'm not a reserved President. I'm a President for everyone, regardless of race, language, religion or creed. There is no diminution in even one bit of my desire, passion and commitment to serve."**

SMOU heartily congratulates President Halimah on her presidency and wishes her all the best in her new role.

- Joined NTUC in 1978, rising through the ranks to become NTUC Assistant Secretary-General in 1999, Deputy Secretary-General in 2007 and Director of the NTUC Women's Development Secretariat in 2008
- Strong advocate for the rights of women employees and domestic workers
- Oversaw a slew of programmes for professionals, managers and executives and low-wage workers
- Former Deputy Member of the Workers' Group in the International Labour Organization (ILO) Governing Body
- Served in various capacities and as the Workers' Group Spokesperson for the Committee on Decent Work for Domestic Workers that led to the adoption of the historic Domestic Workers Convention 2011, No. 189 by the 100th Session of the International Labour Conference in June 2011

PM Lee National Day Message

Our Singapore, Our Future

In his National Day Message to Singapore this year, Prime Minister (PM) Lee Hsien Loong outlined the need to deal with longer-term issues in preparation for the future. Here are the excerpts from his message.

Pressing Concerns

“Terrorism is a major threat, with frequent attacks around the world and closer to home. International trade, a key engine of our growth, is at risk from protectionism. We are busy upgrading our economy. Our students and workers are mastering new skills and staying up to date with technology...But even as we deal with these present issues, we must also look beyond the horizon, and prepare for the future.”

Issues Pertinent to Singapore

“First, we must prepare young Singaporeans for the new world. We want every child to have a good start in life, and a bright future. We have been investing in preschools, because the early childhood years make a big difference to children not just academically, but for life. We will create more preschool places, raise the quality of preschools, and upgrade the profession of preschool teachers.”

“Second, we want Singaporeans to live long and stay healthy...One big reason for ill health in old age is diabetes. Almost a third of those over the age of 60 have diabetes. At first, diabetes is an invisible disease. But over time, its consequences are severe – blindness, heart disease, kidney failure, amputated limbs. This is why we must go all out to fight diabetes...Each one of us must take responsibility for our own health.”

“Third, we want to make full use of IT to create opportunities and jobs for ourselves, and make Singapore an outstanding place to live, work and play. This is why we aim to be a Smart Nation. We have a natural advantage: we are a highly-connected and digitally literate society; we even have more smartphones than people.”

Look Far to Go Further

“We need to look ahead and build for the next generation, just as our forefathers looked ahead and built for us. Here at Bay East we can see how well this has worked for Singapore, and how our generation can keep on doing this.”

When the Founders’ Memorial Committee sought views from the public on where to site the Founders’ Memorial, a clear majority of you supported Bay East. This is a wise choice, which the government has accepted. Here, looking across the Bay and beyond, we can remember the values of our founding leaders, see what they have built, and commit ourselves to continue building Singapore.

Mr Lee Kuan Yew once asked: “At the end of the day, whom do we owe our deepest obligation to as a government?”

And his own answer was: “To the future. Not just to the present; Certainly not to the past.”

This is the spirit of Singapore. Always looking ahead, planning ahead, and staying ahead, so that when the future arrives, we are prepared for it, to ride it and to grow with it. That is how we got here. That is what we must keep on doing together, to open up fresh opportunities for ourselves and our children.”



National Day Rally 2017

Focusing on Singapore's Success and Well-Being

Pre-school education, fighting diabetes and building a Smart Nation were the key concerns highlighted by Prime Minister (PM) Lee Hsien Loong in his National Day Rally speech. "These are things we must work on now to build our future," said PM Lee on 20 August at the Institute of Technical Education (ITE) in Ang Mo Kio. "So that Singaporeans can start right, stay healthy and live smart at every age." Here are some key takeaways from his address.

Starting Right from Young

"Now to take the preschools to the next level, we will roll out three more initiatives. First, we will create more places...In the next five years, we will create an additional 40,000 new places...Second, we will improve the quality of pre-school education for ages five and six, in other words the K1s and the K2s...Thirdly, we will upgrade the pre-school profession in order to attract good teachers and carers because teachers and carers make all the difference to our children."



"We will set up a new institute to train teachers well. Today, there is no centralised institute for early childhood development. Instead we have many different preschool training programmes – in Temasek Polytechnic, Ngee Ann Polytechnic, ITE and the SEED Institute. We will now bring all these different programmes together, under a new centralised institute and we will call it the National Institute of Early Childhood Development (NIEC)."

Combating Diabetes

"If you are my age, over 60, three in ten Singaporeans have diabetes...The challenge with diabetes is that in the early stages, it is an invisible disease... Typically, people will immediately ask: what is the Government doing? But with diabetes, the more important question is: What can I myself do, to change my lifestyle and diet, to minimise my risk?"



"First, please get regular medical check-ups...Take advantage of the health checks at community events or MOH's subsidised screenings under Screen for Life programme...Exercise is good for you. It helps with your blood sugar, your blood pressure...The easiest way to get more exercise is just to walk a little bit more every day."

"My third piece of advice is to eat less and eat healthily... More hawkers serve healthy alternatives – less oil, less sugar, less salt, but tasting almost as good...If you do cook at home, make small changes, like replacing white rice with brown or mixed grain rice...My fourth piece of advice is to cut down on soft drinks...It requires commitment, adjustments to our habits, our lifestyles and diet. But the payoff is large and can be done."

A Smart Nation

"We must simplify and integrate our systems. Monetary Authority of Singapore (MAS) has been working hard at this – integrating the different systems into one – so now at last we have one single unified terminal that can read different cards. MAS and the banks have also rolled out a new service, called PayNow."



"Another area where IT can help is public safety and security...We are building an integrated national sensor network...We are combining inputs from different sources – police, LTA, hotels and commercial buildings, even handphones, which are effectively sensors on the ground. And we are learning to analyse this combined data, for example, using artificial intelligence to automatically flag when something unusual is happening...Traditional retail is being transformed by technology...Use technology to offer customers more efficient, more convenient service."

The Future Awaits

"The world is changing. Unless we change with it, we will fall behind. Singapore must always stay with the leaders to attract talent and business, to live up to our own expectations of what we ought to be and can be."

Celebrate Singapore!



In all things, the Labour Movement (LM) does it together. So when it comes to commemorating Singapore's 52 years of nationhood, close to 2,000 representatives from NTUC affiliated unions and associations, U Associates, NTUC social enterprises, and U SME (small and medium-sized enterprises) and U FSE (freelancers and self-employed) partners got together to celebrate.

Among the tripartite partners at the NTUC-organised National Day Observance Ceremony were Singapore President, then Speaker of Parliament Madam Halimah Yacob, NTUC President Mary Liew, Secretary-General (SG) Chan Chun Sing, Minister of Manpower Lim Swee Say, Second Minister for Manpower Mrs Josephine Teo, and Singapore National Employers Federation President Dr Robert Yap.

During the event which took place at Our Tampines Hub on 8 August, SG Chan highlighted the need for the LM to work closely with tripartite partners, implement the Industry Transformation Maps to help workers get better careers, and continue to equip workers with necessary skills for the jobs of tomorrow.

"We must remember that economic restructuring is ongoing and many companies will need to change and upgrade their business models. This is where our unique tripartite system puts us in good stead. This National Day, we dedicate ourselves to building an even better future for our country," he added.

In honour of Singapore's birthday, the participants recited the pledge and sang the national anthem. They also had the opportunity to visit three LM Showcase Cubes that showed

At the Employment Cube, there was a feature of Shankar Naganathan, the first Singaporean officer employed by Shell and a Tripartite Nautical Training Award (TNTA) Cohort 5 graduate. He is an excellent example of one who has successfully achieved his aspirations of a seafaring officer and has a promising maritime career with good wages.

Public Service Medal for Sister Mary

The contributions and accomplishments of NTUC President and SMOU General Secretary Mary Liew were recognised and acknowledged at this year's National Day Awards. Sister Mary Liew was among the four recipients from the Labour Movement (LM) who received the prestigious Public Service Medal awarded by the President of The Republic of Singapore.

The other three LM recipients were Brother Ong Hwee Liang, NTUC Central Committee Member and SIA Engineering Company Engineers and Executives Union General Secretary; Sister Goh Sor Imm, Singapore Industrial & Services Employees' Union Deputy Executive Secretary; and Brother Rahim Alwi, Amalgamated Union of Public Employees President.

This year's awards recognised over 4,000 individuals across 21 categories for their merit and service to Singapore. Among the recipients was also SMOU's tripartite partner, Capt Muhammad Segar Abdullah, Assistant Chief Executive (Operations) of Maritime and Port Authority of Singapore, who received the Public Administration Medal (Silver)(Bar).

Mary Walks the Talk

"Sister Mary's elections as the first woman General Secretary of SMOU in 2013 and the first woman President of NTUC in 2015, as well as her concurrent positions as an Advisor on various NTUC committees and a Board Director of NTUC Enterprise Co-operative Ltd, are a testament to her strong leadership skills," SMOU Emeritus General Secretary Thomas Tay said.

Sister Mary's journey with the LM begun when she joined SMOU in the 1980s. Besides growing union membership from 3,000 to more than 32,000 today, she contributed towards building the Singapore Core by fostering close tripartite collaborations and communication within the maritime community.

She is also an avid advocate of lifelong learning and supporter of the SkillsFuture movement, and continually pushes for training and development for workers. As the Chairperson of the NTUC Education and Training Fund (NETF) fundraising committee, she champions the fundraising efforts to support workers in skills upgrading, including a \$650,000 contribution from SMOU towards the NETF.

Sister Mary's empathy for the less fortunate was instrumental in SMOU's adoption of Henderson Home for senior citizens, and in the setup of the SMOU Care Fund in 2016 to assist members facing financial difficulties.

On an international level, Sister Mary has taken on roles in various committees of the International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) and was elected into the ITF Executive Board in 2010, and re-elected to serve in 2014.

In the International Labour Organization (ILO), she is a Deputy Member of the Governing Body (Workers' Group).

The International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) Southeast Asia office opened its doors on 6 September 2017 – right here in Singapore.

Located at the Seacare Building, the office will aid union membership growth in Asia Pacific and enable ITF to reach out to more transport workers as an ITF centre of excellence in the region.

The office was officially opened by Guest-of-Honour ITF President Paddy Crumlin, in the presence of 200 guests consisting of ITF affiliates and local tripartite partners. Among them were ITF General Secretary (GS) Stephen Cotton, SMOU President Capt Robin Foo, GS Mary Liew and Emeritus GS Thomas Tay.

"As a trade union organisation, we've identified Asia Pacific as a major area of growth. We're demonstrating that we can build a better world. Singapore provides so much to the world in terms of leadership and functionality," Mr Crumlin shared in his speech.

"We're excited about this new opportunity – every new resource to support workers on the ground is a step forward. Singapore is a solid base for us to reach out to the rest of Southeast Asia," Mr Cotton added. "Without the consensus and support from our maritime brothers and sisters and transport workers, this would not have been possible."

Being one of the Global Union Federations (GUF) allied with the International Trade Union

Confederation (ITUC), ITF has around 700 unions in 150 countries representing workers across sectors ranging from civil aviation to tourism and inland navigations. It has regional offices in Africa, America, Europe and Asia Pacific.

“ We believe that we will have many collaborations with the ITF in the future to benefit the workers in this region. We also look forward to the ITF's continued support for our unique culture of tripartite social dialogue, which has been a cornerstone of our harmonious industrial relationship.

Investing in Our Future Maritime Talents

Four SMOU-sponsored scholars were among the students who received the MaritimeONE Scholarship Awards, an initiative spearheaded by the Singapore Maritime Foundation (SMF) and its affiliated tripartite partners to groom young talents into future leaders in the maritime industry.

The students received the coveted scholarships, amounting to S\$10,000 per student, from SMOU President Capt Robin Foo at the presentation ceremony held at Conrad Centennial Hotel on 11 August. The scholarship covers tuition fees for three years, studying materials and other incidental costs.

The ceremony, which also marked MaritimeONE's 10th anniversary, was attended by Maritime and Port Authority of Singapore (MPA) Chairman Niam Chiang Meng, MPA Chief Executive Andrew Tan and SMF Chairman Andreas Sohmen-Pao, as well as representatives from shipping companies and sponsors. This year saw 49 MaritimeONE scholarship and Tripartite Maritime Scholarship (TMSS) awards totalling close to S\$1.8 million being given out. Twelve students were presented with the TMSS, which is jointly sponsored by SMOU, MPA and other shipping companies.

Since 2013, SMOU has been a sponsor for MaritimeONE scholars and strong supporter of the TMSS programme.

Madan's newfound freedom

SMOU granted the wish of beneficiary 17-year-old Madan Saravanapavan who was born with popliteal pterygium syndrome, a condition that hinders regular body growth. Currently in secondary one, Madan has poorly functioning kidneys which are progressively degenerating as he ages. His condition makes it tough for him to use a manual wheelchair and he has to rely on his family and friends to perform daily tasks.

With the donation, Madan's dream for a motorised wheelchair was fulfilled right before his eyes on 6 July, when SMOU President Capt Robin Foo and Assistant Secretary (AS) Joyce Lee personally delivered the wheelchair to Madan's home.

A specially hosted trip to the Marina Bay Sands SkyPark Observation Deck and a guided tour of the ArtScience Museum was arranged by Make-A-Wish Foundation on 8 July. Among those present at the outing were SMOU First Vice President Rahim Jaffar, Treasurer Tan Hung Tat and AS Joyce Lee.

“Thanks to the motorised wheelchair, I can now move about freely in school and spend quality time with my mum outdoors. It's a huge blessing! I would like to thank SMOU and the donors for their compassion in granting my wish,” Madan said.

Solidarity reigns at second **KISS ME Meeting**

A follow up from the first Korean Interim Seafarers' Steering and Monitoring And Evaluation Group (KISS ME) meeting in Korea this February, the second meeting was hosted on 3 and 4 August by Associated Marine Officers' and Seamen's Union of the Philippines (AMOSUP) in their office in Manila.

Moderated by SMOU Emeritus General Secretary (GS) Thomas Tay, the meeting led to FKSU and KMSU signing a Memorandum of Agreement to establish a new federation with a new constitution, further advancing the reconciliation process between the two unions.

It was attended by Chairman of Asia Pacific Seafarers' Regional Committee (APSRC) Yasumi Morita, 2nd Vice-Chair of International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) Seafarers Section Dr Conrad Oca, ITF Executive Board member Mary Liew and Singapore Organisation of Seamen GS Kam Soon Huat, as well as delegates from the Federation of Korean Seafarers' Union (FKSU) and Federation of Korean Maritime Seafarers' Union (KMSU).



Over US\$320k Payout to Crew of Captain Silver

Gratitude was written all over the faces of 26 crew members of chemical tanker Captain Silver when they received their backdated wages of over US\$320,000 on 3 August, which were owed to them since February this year.

It all started with SMOU receiving a distress call for help from Captain Neeraj Khanna, who reported that the crew had not been fully paid since February this year and needed assistance to claim their outstanding wages.

The SMOU Industrial relations (IR) team and lawyers from Gurbani & Co visited the distraught crew onboard to offer expert advice and a ray of hope.

A P&I (Protection and Indemnity) Club in Singapore also stepped in to iron out the procedures on the salary and repatriation costs payout. P&I clubs help provide insurance to seafarers, under the new amendments to the international Maritime Labour Convention 2006 since the beginning of 2017.

With their hard earned wages in their pocket, the crew returned home overjoyed. "This would not have been successful if the captain and crew had not pulled themselves together to work in unity and take action, with the help of the union and lawyers, to have their claims secured," said IR Assistant Manager Terence Tan.

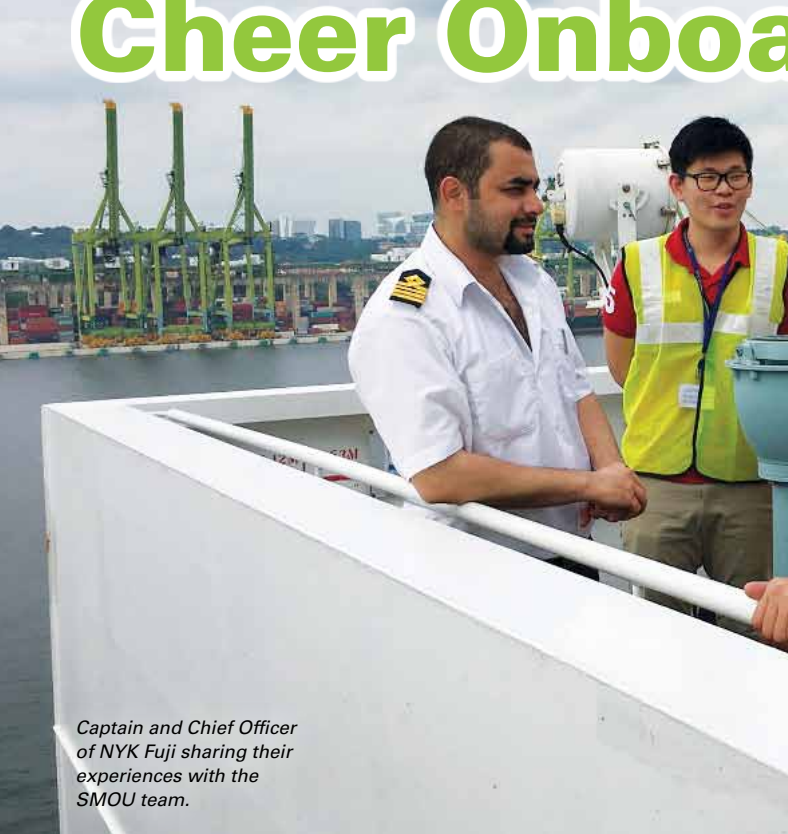

Besides showing off their bowling prowess, the participants also had the chance to win lucky draw prizes and network with like-minded bowlers.

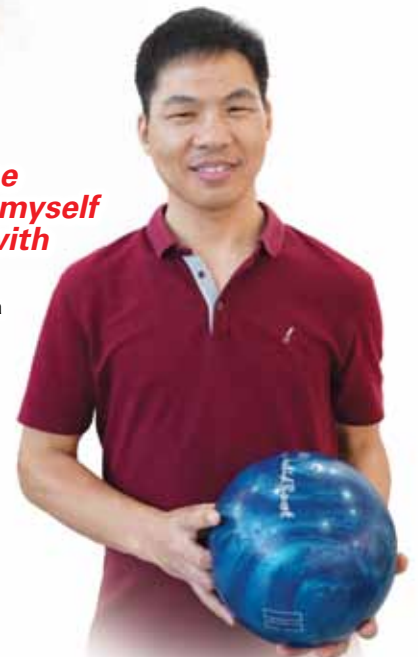

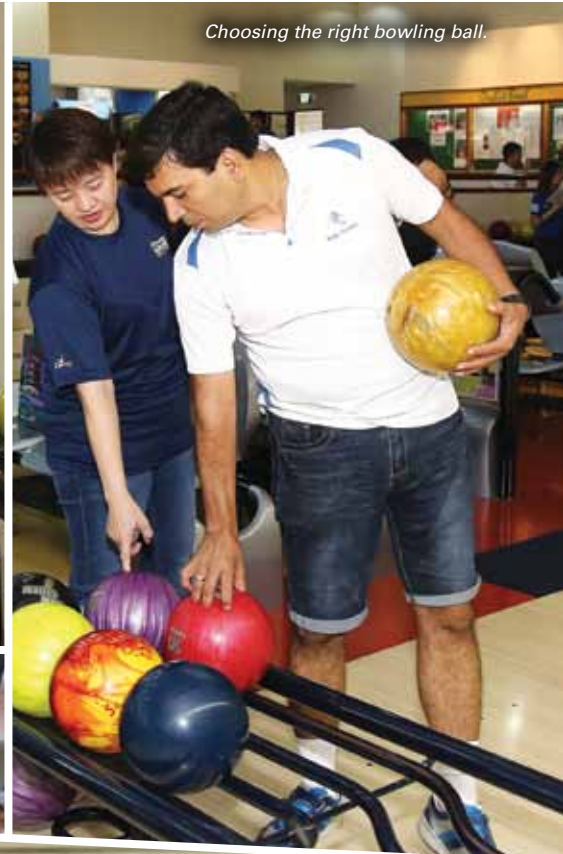

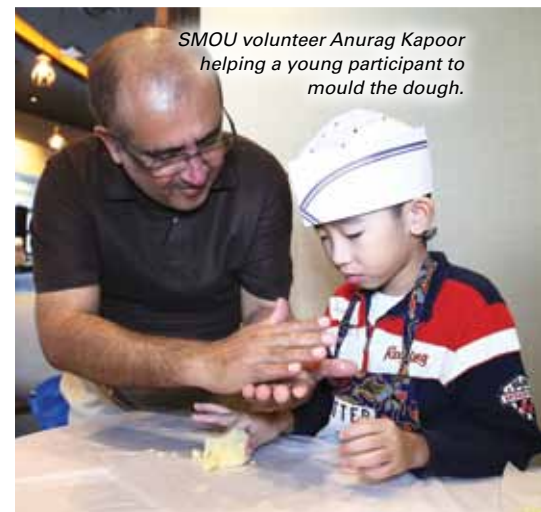
"Baking" a Difference

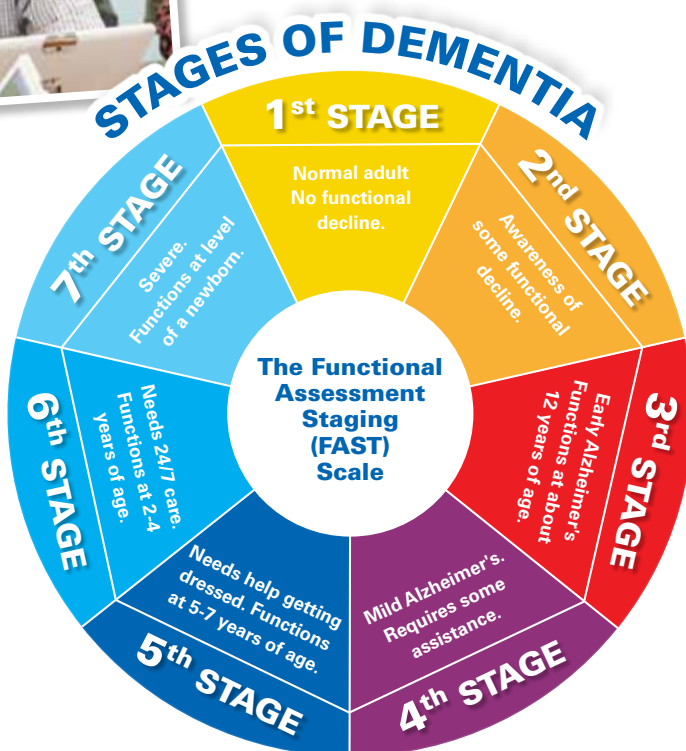

Spread the Word

Set up by SMOU in 2001 to improve the welfare of seafaring members on board ships covered by the SMOU Collective Bargaining Agreements (CBA), the Seafarers' Provident Fund (SPF) was administered and managed by Wavelink Thrift Pte Ltd, and co-managed by NTUC Thrift & Loan. From 1 October 2012 onwards, NTUC Thrift & Loan has discontinued with the administration and management of the SPF and has since terminated SPF.

SPF is now governed by the Scheme of Administration to provide a clear and transparent mechanism for the dissolution and distribution of the SPF funds.

How To Collect Your Seafarers' Provident Fund (SPF)

Members are required to submit their request for SPF withdrawal with the relevant documentations:

1. Duly completed Withdrawal Form (download from www.ispf.org.sg)
2. Copy of NRIC/Passport (both old and new ones)
3. Copy of Seaman Log Book(s)/CDC
4. Copy of Bank book/statement, indicating name of the bank, member's name and member's bank account number.
5. Indicate mode of payment:
Telegraphic Transfer for members who are based overseas. (Please provide the Swift Code of the overseas (beneficiary) bank account; OR
Direct Funds Transfer to a Local (Singapore-based) Bank Account.
6. Provide additional documents such as Death, Birth and/or Marriage Certificate if payout is to be made in the name of the nominee/beneficiary.

Note

1. Charges for Telegraphic Transfer will be imposed by the bank and offset from the payout money.
2. An administrative fee of 2.8% approved by the SPF Advisory Committee shall be deducted from the SPF money due to the member before payout to the member or the member's proper claimant.
